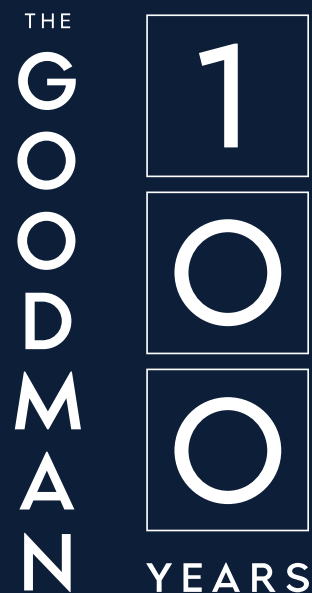

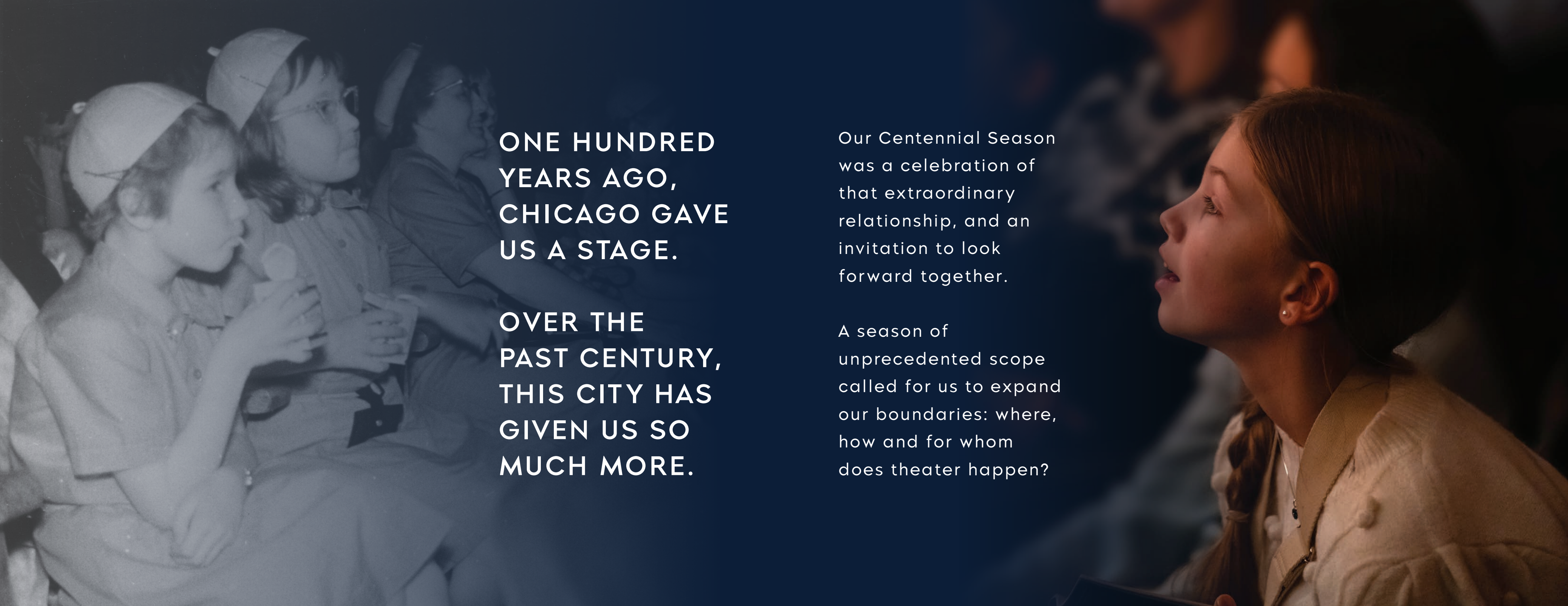

OUR CENTENNIAL GIFT

We set out to bring 100 free activations to Chicago over the course of the Centennial Season. We surpassed our goal by nearly 30%.

100 Free Acts of Theater was an unprecedented citywide initiative brought performances and creative experiences into all 50 wards of Chicago—offered completely free of charge, with all involved artists compensated—in partnership with the Chicago Department of Cultural Affairs and Special Events.

Essential to this success were our community partners, whose deep neighborhood connections and outreach helped us meet audiences where they live, work and gather.

This investment is central to The Goodman's role and responsibility as one of the country's leading not-for-profit theaters: not simply producing what already exists, but helping create what comes next.

THE ARTS ARE GOOD FOR CHICAGO

Theater brings people together and sends them back into the city.

A night at the theater is part of a larger Chicago experience: dinner at a neighborhood restaurant, a train or rideshare downtown, parking, childcare, a post-show night-cap. Each choice extends the value of the theater into communities.

THE PEOPLE OF THE GOODMAN: STACEY BAILEY

During this milestone season, we spotlight those who have filled our spaces for 100 years.

For **Stacey Bailey**, theater is a lifelong passion sparked by her very first experience at The Goodman—one that set the standard for more than 20 years of attending live performance. What began as childhood wonder grew into a deep love of storytelling and shared experience. As a Chicagoland native, The Goodman remains Stacey's happy place, and a space for celebration and reflection.

Q: Has a Goodman production ever changed the way you think about something, or stayed with you long after the curtain fell?

Performances have challenged me in a way I didn't expect, pushing me to think beyond the surface and sit with deeper questions about life. I don't rush to leave. I sit in silence for a moment, completely still, and reflect. That's what great theater does. It doesn't end when the lights come up.

Q: What keeps you coming back—what makes The Goodman feel like "your" theater?

The hush before the first note, the way a story can reach deep inside and linger long after the curtain falls. I keep coming back because it's a guaranteed place where creativity thrives, and every show leaves me refreshed, thrilled and hungry for more.

Q: If you were to describe The Goodman in one word, what would it be, and why?

Sanctuary. The Goodman is my personal refuge, a place

that feeds my artistic and creative soul. More than just a theater, it offers "me time" in the most joyful way—a space to be moved, inspired and fully immersed—truly necessary for recharging and celebrating the magic of live performance.

Q: Why do you think live theater matters?

Live theater matters because it is immediate, immersive and human in a way no other art form can be. It brings stories to life before your eyes, connecting performers and audience in a shared experience that exists only in that moment. Watching a story unfold live is not just entertainment, it's a reminder of the beauty, complexity and resilience of life itself.

Q: When you think about "leaving more human," what does that mean to you?

It means walking out of the theater a little more connected. It's about being reminded of our capacity to feel deeply, to care and to see life through someone else's eyes.

Q: What's something you wish more people knew about attending live theater?

I wish more people understood that attending live theater can be a form of therapy. A great performance doesn't just entertain, it moves you, challenges you and leaves you emotionally satiated. Experiencing theater at its best reminds you why stories matter and why human connection matters.



TRADITION MEETS TRANSFORMATION

The stories endure. The way we tell them evolves.

The Centennial Season honored our history and brought our beloved stories and traditions to new generations.

- *A Christmas Carol* returned for its 48th year; now in the hands of The Goodman's BOLD Artistic Producer Malkia Stampley, the timeless tale met the moment.
- Philip Barry's *Holiday*, previously produced in 1930, 1939, 1947 and 1979, appeared in a sparkling new adaptation by the late Tony Award winner Richard Greenberg.
- August Wilson's *Ma Rainey's Black Bottom* was newly helmed by Chuck Smith and Harry J. Lennix, who brought fresh energy and perspective to this landmark drama.

Our Education and Engagement team deepened The Goodman's presence across the city—working alongside Chicago's Public Schools, Libraries and Park District, as well as community-based organizations throughout Chicago. These partnerships bring theater into spaces citywide, while bringing knowledge, experiences and perspectives of those communities into The Goodman. Together, we create opportunities for people to gather, tell stories, explore ideas and participate in the cultural life of our city.

INVESTING IN OUR FUTURE

Great theater is made possible by people who believe.

The ambition of the Centennial Season was fueled by an extraordinary community of donors, members, foundations, corporations and public partners.

5,563 DONORS

16% GROWTH IN FUNDRAISING

With a median gift of just \$32, this groundswell of supporters made an indelible impact on our work, whether they were making their first-ever gift or their fiftieth.

Donors also came together in circles and communities to revel in their shared love of our work and deepen their relationship to the theater. Hundreds of private supporters joined our Premiere Society, bringing this family of theater champions to its highest level yet, while civic-minded Chicago corporate leaders gathered on our Business Council to network with like-minded individuals and invest in their community.

Across the Goodman Board of Trustees, Women’s Board and Scenemakers Board, hundreds of volunteers lent time, talent and treasure to help us more fully realize our vision as a major Chicago cultural institution.

This enthusiasm also found expression in more public happenings.

In October, stage and screen star Jenna Fischer shared her thoughts about formative experiences in the arts with Walter Artistic Director Susan V. Booth as a part of our annual Education Benefit; in May, multihyphenate entertainer Tituss Burgess dazzled audiences with a live show, followed by dinner and dancing at the Goodman Gala.

In total, these events raised \$1.6M in support of the theater’s Education and Engagement programs.

This is the power of philanthropy: not simply to support a season of theater, but to give us the capacity to imagine—and build—the next 100 years.

THE PEOPLE OF THE GOODMAN: JUARIA SHELTON

During this milestone season, we spotlight those who have filled our spaces for 100 years.

For **Juaria Shelton**, theater is an expression of love. As a Chicago native, she remembers her mother introducing her to The Goodman as a child—an experience that stayed with her. Now, she’s introducing her own grandchildren to the theater, continuing a family tradition rooted in shared experience. Juaria treasures the opportunity to gather with friends and family and create lasting memories together. For her, quality time is priceless, and the memories created at The Goodman last far longer than any physical gift.

Q: Has a Goodman production ever changed the way you think about something, or stayed with you long after the curtain fell?

I find that productions are teaching tools. If you’re really living and paying attention, most entertainment carries a meaningful message. Goodman Theatre has long been one of my favorite theaters. The artistry, the storytelling and the powerful connection created with the audience make every performance a truly unforgettable experience. Those moments stay with you.

Q: If you were to describe The Goodman in one word, what would it be, and why?

Extraordinary. When you enter the theater and you’re

greeted with excitement from the staff, it makes you feel at home and gives you peace of mind. Over the years, I’ve built real relationships with The Goodman team, and that personal connection means a lot. It feels good to be recognized and valued. The Goodman is like the wind, you can just *feel* it!

Q: Why do you think live theater matters?

Some things you just have to see to believe. Live theater matters because it invites us to use our imagination and be fully present.

Q: When you think about “leaving more human,” what does that mean to you?

To me, it means feeling more connected. We live in a world that values roots—family, friends and the environments that shape us. Theater reminds us of our shared humanity. It gives us the human touch we all need.

Q: What’s something you wish more people knew about attending live theater?

I wish more people knew how relaxing and restorative it can be. It’s a place to escape the everyday hustle, to breathe and to enjoy meaningful entertainment. I hope future audiences have a breathtaking experience.

In a landmark year for musical theater at The Goodman, two world-premiere musicals redefined what was possible within the form. *Revolution(s)* united an extraordinary team of artists to tell a story of resistance and hope. *Iceboy!* drew audiences from around the world, becoming The Goodman’s best-attended, best-selling production of all time.

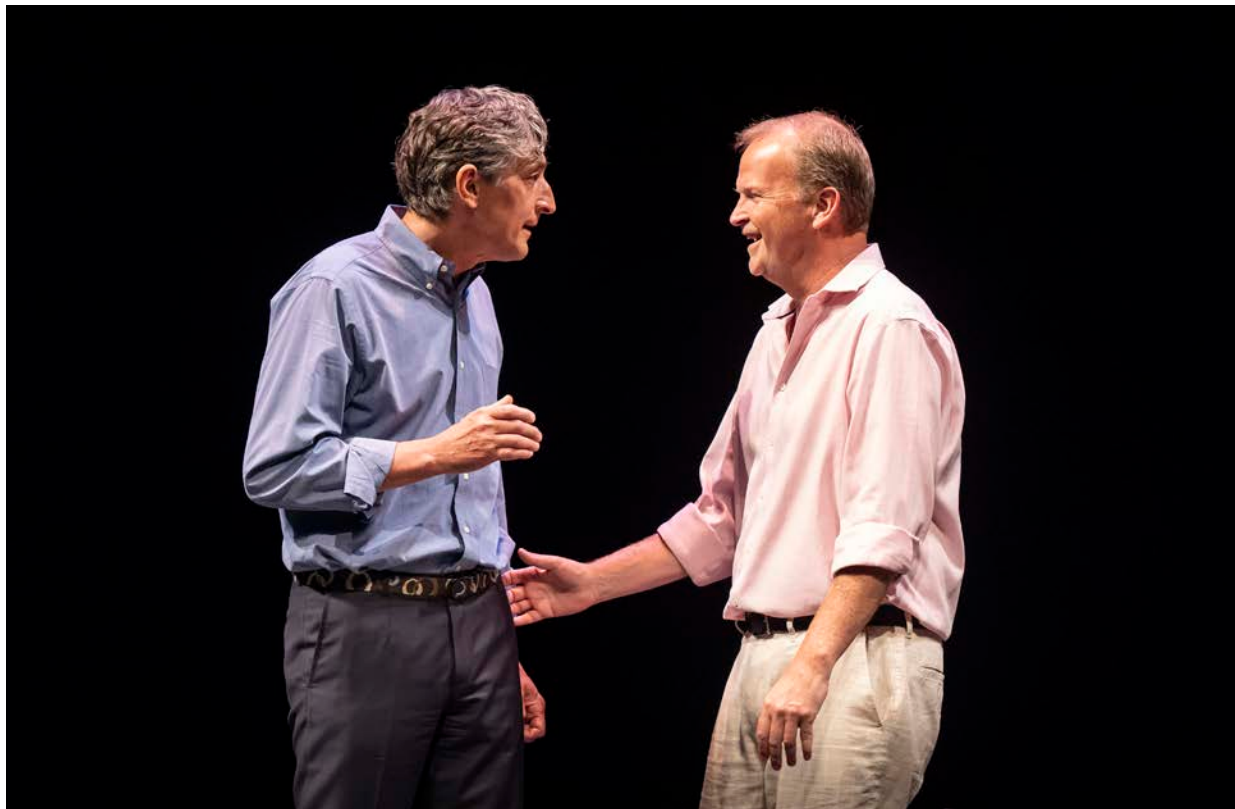
A CITY THAT COMES TOGETHER

THEATER FOR A LIFETIME

Theater can change a life at any age.

The Goodman’s Education and Engagement programs are rooted in a simple belief: everyone should have the opportunity to experience theater—not only as an audience member, but as a creator, learner, collaborator and community member. During the Centennial Season, that belief guided a continuum of programming designed to engage Chicagoans across every stage of life. Our youngest audiences discovered the wonder of live performance through *Theater for the Very Young*. Students experienced professional theater—with nearly one in four doing so for the first time—while teachers gained new tools for bringing arts-integrated learning into their classrooms. Teens developed artistry, confidence and leadership. Adults gathered to learn, create and connect, while older adults transformed memories and lived experiences into stories of their own.

THE PEOPLE OF THE GOODMAN: JIN-SOO HUH

During this milestone season, we spotlight those who have filled our spaces for 100 years.

Jin-Soo Huh first came to The Goodman in 2014 and has been coming back ever since. For him, the theater is both entertaining and thought-provoking—a place where stories stay with you long after the performance ends.

Q: Tell us the story about how you first came to The Goodman.

After reading reviews, I came to see *Smokefall* in 2014. I was so intrigued by this magical realism story about family relationships. I was only able to catch the final performance and was so disappointed I couldn't see it again! The story, set, acting, everything was just so striking. I still think about this show.

Q: Do you have a favorite memory or experience?

There are so many! One that sticks out to me is the 2017 production of *A View from the Bridge* directed by Ivo van Hove. My mom was visiting me and I was able to take her to it and got seats on the stage. The story is captivating and a classic for a reason, and it's a production my mom and I still talk about.

Q: Has a Goodman production ever stayed with you after the curtain fell?

School Girls; Or, The African Mean Girls Play has definitely stayed with me. The play was comedic to start and then hit the audience with a gut punch that made us feel empathy for an antagonist with commentary on colorism. My friends and I who watched it had a long discussion about the show afterward and the artificial hierarchies we create even within communities that are sometimes viewed as monoliths.

Q: What keeps you coming back—what makes The Goodman feel like “your” theater?

I love the range of shows I see at The Goodman. There are straight plays and musicals, star-studded productions and workshops, classics and new works. Whatever the show, I know it will be a high-quality night that will be entertaining and thought-provoking.

Q: If you were to describe The Goodman in one word, what would it be, and why?

Stimulating. Like all good theater, The Goodman's productions entertain. I also know that these shows will leave me thinking for a long time about the human experience and/or about issues like race, class structures and gender.

Q: Why do you think live theater matters right now?

I believe there are deep divisions in this country and folks are just not connecting. Theater can help provide mirrors that reflect our experiences and also windows that help us understand the experiences of others to help bridge this divide.

Q: When you think about “leaving more human,” what does that mean to you?

“Leaving more human” to me means experiencing parts of the human experience through stories told on stage, where the audience learns about people with experiences different from themselves, connects with characters with similar experiences, and recognizes universal human experiences.
